Where to Visit

Yangon is the capital city, also one of the main gateways to Myanmar. Evergreen and cool with lush tropical trees, shady parks and beautiful lakes, Yangon has earned the title, 'The Garden City of the East'. Yangon, meaning 'end of strife', was renamed from Dagon by King Alaungpaya after he reorganized the third Myanmar Empire in A.D.1755.

The most famous pagoda in Yangon is the Shwedagon Pagoda, one of the greatest wonders of the world. It is a 2500-year old pagoda and also the first pagoda on earth. The perimeter of the base of the Pagoda is 1,420 feet and its height 326 feet above the platform. It is plated with more than 30 tons of gold, towering 98m over the city. A number of Myanmar kings and queens donated pure gold equivalent of their body weight to this pagoda throughout the history. The tip of the golden cone is set with rubies, diamonds, sapphires and topaz, and around the main stupa are more than 100 smaller pavilions and halls. If you still have time, Maha Wizaya Pagoda is just next to Shwedagon. There is a very interesting thing if you are into architecture. There is a specially-designed hole on the ceiling, that only permits the sunlight to inside only a single day every year. That day is Myanmar New Year Day according to Myanmar lunar calendar. The National Museum houses the famous Lion Throne of last Myanmar kings. Priceless ancient artifacts and historic memorabilia are also displayed. Bogyoke Aung San Market is situated in the heart of Yangon. It is one of the most popular tourists destinations. A lot of souvenir, jewelry, handicraft, tapestry shops are there. Vendors in this market are generally easier to communicate in English than other shopping centers. The Karaweik is a classy modern restaurant, in the form of a huge Myanmar mythical bird, standing in the Kandawgyi Lake. Traditional dance performance, small scale Myanmar orchestra, and puppet shows are performed every night. It's often full. Make sure you reserve ahead. Kandawgyi Nature Park, is a newly renovated park which is not far from Shwedagon. You can see the water fountains, the green sceneries, and the marble elephants. Sule Pagoda is the landmark of the heart of Yangon, located near the City Hall and the Myanmar Travels and Tours office. It is said to be 2000-years old. The stupa is 46m high and it is in a strange octagonal shape.

Kaba Aye Pagoda (World Peace Pagoda) was built for the 6th international Buddhist council in 1954. The World Buddhist Summit was held at the Maha Pasana Cave, near the pagoda. Botataung Pagoda, meaning 1,000 leaders, it is said to have the genuine hair relics of Buddha. The pagoda is hollow inside and it is a sort of a mirror-maze inside. Chauk Htat Gyi Buddha houses the fourth largest colossal reclining Buddha with an enigmatic smile on his delicate lips. The image itself is 67m long and famous for the 108 distinguishing marks/symbols on the soles of his two huge feet. Kyauk Taw Gyi Buddha is the largest marble Buddha in the world sculptured out from a single piece of marble stone.

Yangon Vicinity -- Bago (Pegu): The historical town of Bago, situated about 75 kilometers northeast of Yangon, was founded in 573 by two Mon princes and soon developed into the capital of the most important realm of the Mon people. Shwemawdaw Pagoda's height of 373 feet is taller than the famous Shwedagon Pagoda. Shwethalyaung Buddha is a famous reclining image of a huge Buddha, 180 feet in length and 52.5 feet in height. It was "lost" for many years as it was covered with earth in the scrub jungle, until an Indian contractor dug the place. The image was restored in 1881. It is also known as "the golden reclining image". Kanbawza Thadi Palace was built by King Bayinnaung, the founder of the second Myanmar Empire. According to the drawing record made by a minister 'Letwe Nawrahta' there were totally 76 apartments and halls. The replica of the palace was reconstructed in 1990 and finished in 1992.

Yangon Vicinity -- Thanlyin (Syriam): Thanlyin formerly known as Syriam is just across the river, spanned by one of the longest bridges in Myanmar. Half-an-hour drive by car or train, this colonial town was built by the British for its port and petroleum refinery plant. The tombs of 2 famous Myanmar poets laureate of 16th century, an 18th century Portuguese Church, and a century-old Sacred Heart Church are there. Kyaik Kauk Pagoda: It is built on a hillock on the road to Kyauk Tan. It is an imposing golden stupa similar to the Shwe Dagon pagoda. Yaylei Pagoda means the pagoda in the middle of water. The pagoda complex comprises several buildings including a monastery. Pilgrims and visitors are ferried across to the pagoda. One can feed shoals of long river catfish, which surface to snatch tit-bits of food thrown at them.

Yangon Vicinity -- Pyay (Prome): Pyay is an important commercial center for trade between the Ayeyarwaddy Delta, but it is only about 6 hours drive from Yangon. The famous Shwesandaw Pagoda is well known in Pyay. Also the Srikeshtra, ancient Pyu capital can be visited. It's about 5 miles to the east of the city.

Mingun Pahtotawgyi: Over 20,000 workers toiled for twenty years on the construction of the Pahtodawgyi Pagoda, which was unfortunately abandoned due to the death of King Bodawpaya in 1819. A 15-foot miniature model of the pagoda is in close proximity. It was completed to a height of 162 feet. Up to the first terrace is less than one third of the final height. This unfinished structure was badly damaged with cracks by the earthquake of 1838 but it is still the largest brick base in the world. **Mingun Bell:** It is a huge bronze bell near the Mingun Zedi on the west bank of the Ayeyarwaddy River. It weighs 55555 viss (100 tons). It is the world's biggest ringing bell. **Myatheindan Pagoda:** Built by King Bagyidaw in 1816, three years before he succeeded Bodawpaya as a king. It was built as a representation of the Sulamani Pagoda which, according to the Buddhist plan of the cosmos, stands atop Mount Meru. This pagoda was badly damaged in 1838 by a quake but King Mindon restored it in 1874.

Mandalay Vicinity - Pyin Oo Lwin: A pretty little hill resort, 67km east of Mandalay. Pyin Oo Lwin (formerly Maymyo), was a hill station established by the British as a cool retreat from the heat of the central Myanmar plains. Pyeik Chin Myaung, Pwe Kauk Fall and the Maha Anhtookanthar Paya are tourist attractions in this area.

Mandalay Vicinity - Shwebo : It is 64 miles north of Mandalay on the motor and railroad to Myitkyina. It can be reached by car or rail from Mandalay under four hours. The ruins of ancient culture can be seen at Hanlin, a few miles south of Shwebo.

Festivals around Mandalay

Kyaukse Dancing Elephant festival usually takes place around **September**. A huge elephant figure is made from bamboo and paper. It is a marvelous performance of 2 men together to dance in rhythm. The elephant dancers circles 3 times at the foot of the hill to pay homage to the Shwe Tha Lyaung Buddha.

Mount Popa Nat festival shows the still active cult of the 37 nats in the forgotten land of Myanmar. Difficult to define but nats may be said to be somewhere between the spirits and the gods. Every year, in the month of **August**, this festival is held in Taung Byone with full of colors and attractions.

Ngapali Beach

The beaches of Myanmar belong to most beautiful Southeast Asia beaches and are however still nearly undiscovered. Among them Ngapali is the most beautiful among them all.

Situated about 7 km away from Thandwe, one of the ancient Rakhine towns and on the Bay of Bengal. It is said to have been named after the Naples of Italy by a homesick Italian. It is famous for its natural and unspotted beauty up to this day. The beach stretches about 3 km with soft white sand fringed by coconut palms. It lies on one of the finest seaside in the country. It serves as the best ground for sunbathing and recreation such as beach strolling, cycling and so on. Unlike today's beaches of Asia, it is free of noisy beachside bars, crowded people and hawkers persuading you to buy their things. There are only natural scenic beauty of the blue sea, white sand and the lovely sun. The sea is cobalt blue, without any dangerous marine animals and clean.

Actually, Ngapali is not one single beach, but a series of beaches interspersed with small fishing villages stretching from Mazin where the airport is located, to Lontha on Mayo Bay where coastal steamers dock in a sheltered anchorage. Undoubtedly one of the best places for a relaxing holiday is Ngapali Beach near Thandwe in Rakhine State, on the Bay of Bengal. This beach is 1 of the loveliest places in Myanmar; it is also one of the most unspoilt beaches in the world, with miles of pure white sands skirting the crystal clear waters of the Indian Ocean.

The water here is transparent and the sea is tranquil. Bicycle tours can be arranged to visit nearby villages. You can also explore the area with an ox truck. The villagers usually sun-dry their fish, shrimp and coconuts. These products are transported to Yangon and over the country. This is one of their main occupations. The best time to visit this beach is during October and May of every year.

Luxurious resorts are built among coconut palms, designed in traditional Southeast Asian elegance and is constructed in local materials of teakwood, ironwood and marble. Ngapali is accessible by flight which takes about 45 minutes from Yangon, by car about 14 hours drive along the Rakhine Yoma mountain range. Ngapali has 9-holes golf resort, where you can relax.

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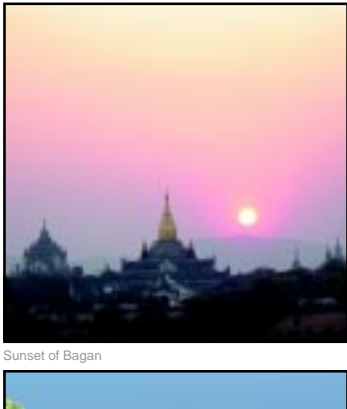

King Nadaungmya in A.D 1211, the 50 meters high Htilominlo is one of the largest temples of Bagan; and is noted for its fine plaster carvings. Gubyaukgyi Temple: It is noted for its wall paintings, depicting scenes from the previous lives of the Buddha. Manuha Temple: Situated in the southern end of Myinkaba village. In A.D 1059, the captured King Manuha had built himself this two-storey square white temple and through it conveyed a melancholy message. Gawdawpalin Temple : It was built during the reign of Narapatisithu A.D 1174 and completed during the reign of his successor, Nadaung-mya. Mahabohdi Temple: It was erected during the reign of Nadaungmya A.D 1211, was modeled after the temple of the same name in Bodhgaya, India. It is a 140 foot high brick and whitewashed stucco structure characterized by a large square pyramidal tower and topped by a conical spire and umbrella. Dhammayazika Temple : It looks much like the famous Shwezigon, the Dhammayazika is unusual because it has pentagonal terraces instead of the usual square ones. Above the 3 receding terraces, which are ornamented with glazed Jataka plaques rises a bell-shaped dome, which merges directly into a sharply tapering conical finial.

Archaeological Museum It is now a three storey building built in an octagonal design as the base. The building is fully furnished with Myanmar handicrafts. The ground floor consists of the Main Hall, Arts and Crafts of Bagan Era, Languages and Literatures, Portraits of the Bagan's society and battle fields, Archaeological Designs. On the first floor, Ancient Pagoda's portraits, Ancient wall, Buddha's artistical designs, Buddha's images. On the top floor, you can see the most scenic view of Bagan and it's prehistoric pagodas. The Bagan Archaeological Museum is one of the most important places you should visit while you are in Bagan.

Bagan Lacquerware : Bamboo and wood that are used as frame or base in making lacquerwork are easily and cheaply available around the Bagan area. Lacquer from Thitsi Tree (Melanhorrea Usitata), is applied on the frame, which is native to Southeast Asia.

Bagan Vicinity -- Mount Popa: It is seismically an extinct volcanic crater jutting high above the flat plains of Central Myanmar. It offers a steep climb to the top and many pagodas are built. Also believed to be the above of powerful guardian spirits.

Festivals in Bagan

Ananda Pagoda festival is held one week proceeding the Fullmoon day of Pyatho, usually in **January**. It is held for one week in Bagan. Villagers and pilgrims around Bagan roll in the sacred site of Ananda for the consecration. Villagers from nearby villages come to the festival with bullock wagons and camp for the duration. The wagons are colorfully decorated. Shwezigon Pagoda Festival Visitors offer candles and fireworks are offered to the pagoda. The festival runs from new full moon day of Tazaungmone (usually in **October**).

Where to Visit

Inle lake is located in the heart of Shan State which shares borders with Thailand and Lao. And it climbs up to over 900 meters above sea level and outrageously beautiful. Inle Lake is located in the mountains so it is cooler than other areas. More than 30 hill tribes are living in the mountains. This vast picturesque lake, 900 metres above sea-level, is one of the main tourist attractions in Myanmar. The lake, 22 km long and 10 km across, has a population of some 150,000, many of whom live on floating islands of vegetation. Inle Lake, natural and unpolluted, is famous for its scenic beauty and the unique leg-rowing of the *Inthas*, the native lake dwellers. Inle Lake, natural and unpolluted, is famous for its scenic beauty and the unique leg rowing of the Inthas, the native lake dwellers. High hills rim the lake on both sides. The lakeshore and lake islands bear 17 villages on stilts, mostly inhabited by the Intha people. Phaung Daw Oo Pagoda is one of the most revered Buddhist shrine in Burma. Bagan monarch Alaung Sithu of A.D 12th Century cherishes five images, dedicated to five Buddhas of this planet Earth, here. Taking Phaung Daw Oo as the landmark. The great lake could be toured around. Inlein: One of the small villages of Inle Lake located on the western bank of the lake. A Buddha image has enshrined at a whitewashed stupa, which is on the summit of a hill. Below the stupa around the hill are cluster of hundreds of ancient stupas most are ruins overgrown with bushes. Nga Phe Kyaung (Jumping Cats Monastery): A wooden monastery built on stilts of the lake, 4 years before the construction of Mandalay Palace. It's known as the Jumping Cat Monastery because the monks there have trained their cats to jump and leap through small hoops.

Inle Vicinity -- Kakku Pagodas: Kakku is about 33 miles from Taunggyi. One of the Asia's largest and most spectacular ancient monuments is a wonderful Pagoda named Kakku. It contains over 2,000 stupas with origins dating back many centuries.

Inle Vicinity -- Taunggyi: It is situated in the southern Shan State and is the capital town of Shan States. It is 4,712 feet above the sea level and has a moderate climate. In November, to celebrate the Tazaungdaing festival, the city hosts a hot-air, or fire balloon festival.

Inle Vicinity -- Kalaw: It stands high on the western edge of the Shan Plateau. It is 70 km west of Taunggyi, about halfway along the Thazi-Taunggyi road. This was a popular hill station in the British days

Inle Vicinity -- Pindaya: It is a small quiet town perched on the bank of the placid Botoloke Lake. Pindaya cave is a huge cavern where hundreds and thousands of Buddha images in various size and shape are installed since the 11th century. The most attractive place in Pindaya is the ancient Shwe U Min cave which contains about 8,000 Buddha statues, which are collected over the centuries.

and it is still a peaceful and quiet place. At an altitude of 1,320m it is also pleasantly cool and a good place for hiking amid gnarled pines, bamboo groves and rugged mountain scenery. Those around Kalaw are from four ethnics groups, Palaung, Pa-O, Danu and Taung Yoo.

Festival in Inle

The festival of Phaung Daw Oo is held during **October**. The festival takes about 18 days. It is the biggest occasion held in the Inle Lake, Shan State. The festival is held with great magnificence and pageantry. The holy Buddha's images are placed on a decorated royal barge and towed by leg-rowers around the lake. There are also Shan traditional boat races participated by leg-rowers.

Ethnic Groups

The Union of Myanmar was formed by 135 nationalities, and 7 major national races. Here, we'd like to present you the most popular and near extinction ethnic groups to international tourists. **Padaung** tribe is probably the best well-known Myanmar tribe, often called 'long neck women'. Traditionally Padaung women wear an uncomfortable stack of rings around their neck permanently, which makes their necks longer. Their necks are as long as 14 inches. That is why it was their custom to start putting these copper rings on the necks of female children from the age of 4 to 6 years old. Kayah women, by the time they reached adulthood, almost always have 16 to 22 rings round their necks. You only have the chance to see them while they are alive and before this tribe goes extinct. To visit Padaung people, one has to go to Loikaw, then to Demoso, and then proceed to Pan Pet village which is home to the Padaung people of Kayah State. **Akha** people are known for their very exotic and extraordinarily beautiful costumes and their unique handicrafts. Akha people are found in the mountains of China, Laos, Myanmar and northern Thailand. Like Myanmar, Akha tribe originated in Tibet. Every Akha village is distinguished by their carved wooden gates, guarded by guardian angels. They live in raised houses, with large porches and steep roofs. Visiting Akha villages are very interesting. Most of their costume designs are assorted colors on black background, and they still weave them on foot-treadle loom. Also, **Pa-O** nationals live in Nant Bay village forming a long stretch of dwellings in Southern Shan State and lies between two mountain ranges running from south to north.

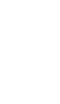

Thingyan : Myanmar's Joyous Festival

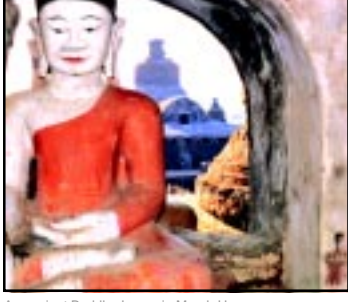

Where to Visit

The famous legendary Kyaikhtiyo pagoda is also well known as Golden Rock. It is located in the Mon State. It is the largest domestic tourism centre located about 160 km from Yangon. Now, it is accessible by car. Kyaikhtiyo Pagoda stands on a gold gilded boulder precariously perched on the edge of the hill over 3,615 feet (1,100m) above sea-level. There are many legends about the pagoda and Nat (spirits) shrines along the 11km uphill hike from the base camp to the pagoda. There is also a popular belief that one will gain more wealth every time he climbs the Hill. The pagoda itself is only about 15 feet high, but it is a breath taking scene to see it in reality.

Kyaikhto Hotel located on the hill side is in full view of the pagoda. The pilgrimage season is from October to March. Coaches reach only Kinpun Base Camp at the foot of the Hills from which visitors trek uphill for about 11km. Porters and palanquins are available to carry luggage and pilgrims who are too old or weak.

Where to Visit

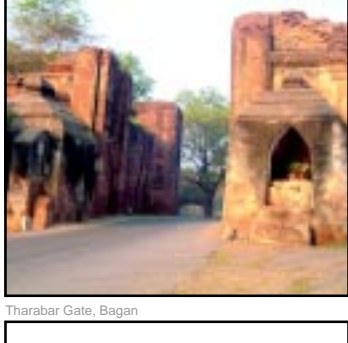
Mrauk-U is located at 20.25'N Latitude and 093.11'E Longitude. It is the 15th century ancient city of Rakhine. There are round about 70 temples and stupas and the remains of the magnificent Royal Palace can be seen in Mrauk-U. The walls were painted with religious sculptures. Once it was the richest city in the whole southeast asian countries during the early ages. Today, the city is about 50 miles from the modern capital Sittwe. It is accessible by daily flight from Yangon. A new Mrauk-U Museum is located near the palace site. It displays some old artifacts of Vesali, Launggret and Mrauk-U periods, ranging from 8th to the 16th century. Also it as a good collection of ancient artifacts unearth around the city. Shitthaung Pagoda : Meaning 80,000 Pagodas is located half mile from the city. It was built by the great King Minbagyi during A.D 1535. First it was built as a fortress against the Portuguese. Koethaung Pagoda : Meaning 90,000 pagodas. It was built by Min Thaikkha during A.D 1553. It is the biggest pagoda in Mrauk-U area. Sand stones are used to build this pagoda. Andaw Pagoda : Meaning the tooth relic of Buddha. It was built by Min Hla Raza during A.D 1521. The tooth relic was obtained from Sri Lanka. Laymyetnha Pagoda : Meaning four faces or sides. King Min Saw Mon built this pagoda during A.D 1430. Dukkanthein : It was used as an Ordination Hall before but now it is an interesting place to visit.

Accommodations: Totally 16,004 (According to 2003 Stats) hotel rooms of all categories serves in the whole country to suit each traveler's price range. Banking / Money Exchange: Compulsory exchange of a few hundreds dollars has been withdrawn. Check the internet for current exchange rates. Money exchangers are not found everywhere. Business Hours: 9am-5pm. Government offices: 9:30-4:30. Major Credit cards are not widely accepted. Cash is always more convenient. Currency: National currency is Kyat. Departure: Export permit is required for some jewelries and artifacts. Antiques and archaeologically valuable items are not allowed for export. DOs & DON'Ts: • Not always necessary to shake hands. • Don't hug or kiss in public. • Don't touch any adult on the head. • Nodding means YES, and shaking head means NO. • When buying gems, sculptures, or any expensive souvenir, make sure it comes with an export permit. • Don't leave expensive items in your room. Use safe deposit box. • Beware of cheats, swindlers, imposters. • Carry some medicines for diarrhea. • On trains, keep windows shut. • Speed or distance descriptions are in miles, not kilometers. • Don't jay walk. Watch where you walk and what you step on. Drug Abuse: Trafficking drugs is a capital offence. Electricity: 200 volts AC, 50Hz. 110 volts is also available in some hotels. Language: Myanmar is the official language, English is widely spoken and understood. Museums: Popular museums are National museum, Drug Elimination Museum, Myanmar Gems

Museum, Defense Services Museum. Public Shopping: Bargaining is acceptable in most places. Jewelries and handicrafts are most popular souvenirs for visitors to Myanmar.
